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#### **2011 Bridge Elections**

structors.

#### Radar Contact Management Class/ B-CSN Bootcamp

The club recently completed two specialized classes. The first was a Radar Contact Management class. This class included a Thursday night shore school lecture on maneuvering board followed by two sets of sailing from Annapolis to Pax River and a return during a three day and two night time period for two different crews. Several Navigation, B-CSN, and D-CS OTWs were completed during the sail. The club used LIT-TLE DARLING, a Jeanneau at ABC which is equipped with radar.



Both crews practiced night anchoring and lots of maneuvering and communicating with big ships and tugs. There was plenty of night watch standing, and several tired sailors. We had all sorts of weather. The return night trip to Annapolis was the Training Commodore's personal record for Pax River to Annapolis, where we averaged 8.2 knots from Cove Point to 1AH with 15 to 20 knots of apparent wind from the west.

#### Radar Contact Management Class/ B-CSN Bootcamp

The second sail was B-CSN "Bootcamp." This idea was generated by former Training Commodore John Cavedo, and involved a concentrated Friday through Sunday evening combination of "chalk talks", intense 24 hour sailing, and cruising exams. It involved having a crew willing to undergo this intense effort for two weekends in succession. The applicants needed to have their Senior Crew qualifications completed, and the plan was for them to earn their B -CSN upon graduation .

It was not for the feint of heart. The first weekend concentrated on navigation, contact management (lots of encounters with big ships and tugs), anchoring, and man overboard competitions. It also included swimming competitions.

The second weekend included lots of close quarters maneuvering, a sail to St. Michaels, and lots of heavy and light air sailing. Its focus was on the Rules of the Road and GK exams.

The successful graduates were Justin Kees, Ross Rosiak, Larry Paulson, Mike Weber, Ken Homick, and Glenn Kesselman.

As many of you know, with this year's B-KBS classes using our River boats, we have been awarding the B-KBS concurrently with the ASA 101 and 103. We have also recently qualified a number of instructors for the River Course at the 201 (the "two" series denotes qualified ASA instructors for those levels), 203, and 205 levels.



We are now in a position to offer an opportunity for existing B-KBS skippers to challenge for the ASA qualification. No classes or on-the-water evaluations are required for those holding the B-KBS Plus qualification. However, ASA has a membership fee and exam fee associated with the exam that you will need to pay.

To pass the exam, you can study the normal US Sailing Series, Chapman's, and the Annapolis School of Sailing book. You can also pay for the ASA textbooks associated with these exams. It is not required, but it is recommended that you buy and study the ASA books.

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#### ASA

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The opportunity to challenge will be at the Spring Cruising Exam Session on Saturday, 19 March 2011.

The cost to challenge for ASA 101 and 103 for those having a B-KBS qualification is \$100 and includes:



- . The ASA 101 and 103 exams.
- · An ASA log Book
- The ASA Sailing Fundamentals textbook.
- ASA membership (first year, required)

Please send in a check to the Treasurer with Winter Training Program (WTP) registration form (see the WTP page of the web site) and your desire for what you would like to order or take. The closeout date for reserving these exams is 15 February 2011.

#### **ASA Navigation Challenge**

In the future, we will be giving the ASA 105 exam as our Navigation exam. As a result, you will get the ASA 105 qualification as one of the benefits of your having passed it, in addition to being on your way for your Navigation qualification.

The opportunity to challenge will be at the Spring Cruising Exam Session on Saturday, 19 March 2011.

The cost of the Navigation Exam (ASA 105) will be \$20, the same for the old PSC Exam. However, you will not be able to get your certificate until you have completed the Navigation OTW. This follows the precedent established for that qualification with the previous exam for the final Navigator qualification.



For you to obtain the ASA 105 certificate, you must be a member of ASA (\$39). When the club raised the cost for the 2010 B-KBS graduates to take the B-KBS class, this cost was factored in. However, it was not included for those graduating in prior years or challenging this year or in previous years. So if you did not graduate from the B-KBS class in 2010 or the ASA Instructor Course, you will have to pay this membership fee.

Although Chapman's, the existing Coastal Navigation Books from US Sailing course, and the existing Navigation Class should be sufficient preparation for the ASA 105 exam, you may want to order the ASA Coastal Navigation Manual (\$60) to help prepare for your study.

Please send in a check and your desire for what you would like to order or take. The closeout date for reserving these exams is 15 February 2011.

Classroom rates remain at \$25, except for the Navigation Class, which is \$25. The CPR class will cost \$62, and has a 2 year CPR and 3 year First Aid qualification that comes with it. Your CPR/First Aid must be current to become or remain a PSC Bay SOR.

The Piloting and Navigation Classes are limited to 15 students. The Celestial Navigation Class is limited to 9 students. These classes, in addition to some lecture, require the instructors to walk around and assist the students to solve problems.

#### Certifications

We have had a few questions about certifications and how they are handled within the club. Whenever a candidate has completed the B-KBS class, the following hard copy documents are maintained in perpetuity:

- The Skills Demonstration sheets that are filled out by the instructors each day.
- The ASA 101 and 103 skill demonstration and test answer sheets.

In addition, a B-KBS class written report is generated and stored electronically. The qualification information is then documented into the Consolidation Qualification Database, an Excel Workbook that is posted on the PSC Website under Learn to Sail. This spreadsheet is the baseline "ground truth" of anyone's qualification. For ASA, the Training Commodore will then fill out a membership form for the member, and then click on a button to send the member their ASA certificates for posting in their log books. This action automatically bills their membership to the club credit card. Because we are still having problems getting our ASA site set up with our instructor credentials entered, we have not been able to complete this step. ASA is working on it, but their staff is overwhelmed with work from other sailing organizations with situations similar to ours.

The next step is that a list of names and qualifications is sent to Navy Sailing and Latitudes and Attitudes Magazine. Navy Sailing will then issue the qualification card. Latitudes and Attitudes has agreed to provide a free one year subscription to new PSC B-KBS course graduates.

For the B-KBS classes, and successful completion of D-CS milestones, a presentation certificate is then generated in PowerPoint, printed and placed in a presentation folder for presentation to the member at the next Club Meeting following their qualification. Although this certificate has no qualification value, its purpose is to provide an attractive method of recognition at club events and encourage members to attend the meetings. If the individual is not

present at the meeting, we no longer mail the certificate to the member. It costs about \$2 and consumes about 1 hour of time to mail the certificates. They also usually do not make it undamaged. We will retain the folder and certificate, as well as continue to bring it to membership meetings. If members desire a copy immediately, a PowerPoint file will be emailed to them.

At the end of the year, a letter is sent to Navy Sailing with the highest qualification level attained by those advancing in the D-CS program during the year.
