

lans are still being made, but the PSC is definitely planning to "sail outside the box" with a week-long Fall flotilla around the Chesapeake Bay. The idea is to put some fun back into sailing and to sail to parts of the bay we normally can't reach to on a one, two, or even three-day sail. We are looking at Labor Day week for the flotilla and we may go North (places such as Havre de Grace, Georgetown, Chesapeake City, Worton Creek, Baltimore) or we might go in another direction. We will visit some Chesapeake Bay towns, some quiet anchorages, and maybe a city or two. We expect the boat costs to be in the neighborhood of \$650 for a space on a PSC chartered boat. Additional costs

will be meals ashore, fuel, pumpouts, marina slip fees, adult beverages, cigars, etc. This is going to be something new for the club so we need your input as we develop the plan. The two things you need to do right now are, 1) mark the dates 1 to 8 September on your calendar, and 2) contact event coordinator Wesley Moy and volunteer to help with the planning effort. We need people to scout possible locations along the bay and we need people to plan and organize events and activities for the flotilla week. Remember this is all about having fun on the water and the more people involved, the more fun it will be for all.

GPS System in Danger?

s a result of a proposal by a private company to use radio frequency bandwidth right next to the existing GPS radio bandwidth, the future reliability of the GPS system across the United States is now in question. The nation's largest recreational boaters group, BoatUS, says boaters could have a hard time avoiding treacherous shoals or simply finding their way home if GPS signals are interfered with...

At issue is an unusual conditional waiver granted in January 2011 by the Federal Communications Commission (FCC) to a broadband wireless communications provider, LightSquared, to permit the dramatic expansion of land-based use of mobile satellite spectrum. This spectrum, or frequency bandwidth, is directly adjacent to the frequencies used for Global Positioning System (GPS) communications.

The company has proposed to build 40,000 ground stations. LightSquared's high-powered ground-based transmissions from these stations have shown to cause interference in hundreds of millions of GPS receivers across a wide range of uses, including aviation, marine, emergency response and industrial users such as delivery and trucking companies. A new report requested by the FCC says, "all phases of the LightSquared deployment plan will result in widespread harmful interference to GPS signals and service and that mitigation is not possible."

Recreational boaters lost their only other viable navigation system, LORAN, when the Department of Homeland Security shut the system down last year. At that time the US Coast Guard urged mariners to shift to GPS-based navigation systems. Boaters rely on GPS-enabled chart-plotters to steer clear of navigation hazards, keep them in the safety of deep-water channels, or even get them home when storms shut down visibility. "They are a critical piece of safety gear," said Podlich. "What will boaters do if they are unreliable, and how will the US Coast Guard's new emergency search and rescue system that stands watch over 36,985 miles of coastline, Rescue 21, remain effective, since it relies on GPS?"

Did You Ever Wonder About the Big Ships Sailing Up and Down the Bay or Anchored Near Annapolis?

ant to keep track of the big ships coming and going in the world's harbors and coastal waters? You can, thanks to the Internet and Automatic Identification System (AIS), now required on all commercial vessels. Go to www.marinetraffic.com, zero in on where your curiosity leads on a world map, then mouse on over to one of the color-coded vessel icons displayed. Not only will it call up the name and type of vessel, it will show national flag and near-real-time coordinates. Click on that and in many cases you get a window with a picture of the vessel, its vital statistics, destination, and its (estimated time of arrival).





While international maritime agreement mandates AIS on commercial vessels over 300 gross

tons, private recreational vessels may equip with transmitters voluntarily and will show up on the system under the purple "Yachts & Others" icon. The University of the Aegean in Syros, Greece, hosts the system, described as "an academic, open, community-based project." The information about ship movements and ports around the world that have AIS networks is free, but the system also offers special paid-subscriber services such as tracking "My Fleet." You can even elect to display text in one of 29 languages.



Well, It's Not Just the Guys

ale sailors are, or should be, aware of the danger of falling overboard while relieving themselves over the side. Many are the tales of drowned sailors found with their flies open. But what about women? They are obviously not deaf to the siren call of urinating al fresco, going by this story from the Mediterranean.



Famed French solo sailor Florence Arthaud was rescued off Corsica after she "quite simply fell into the water while preparing to take a pee," as she told a French television station.

Arthaud was alone on her 33-foot sloop. Luckily for her, she keeps her cellphone in a waterproof case and was able to call her mother, who alerted authorities. She was rescued after two hours in the water.

A national heroine in France, Arthaud was a renowned solo racer in the 1990s and was once rescued from a capsized boat in the Atlantic. Her latest rescue does not have quite the same cachet.

The Dark 'N' Stormy

s many hundreds of Newport-Bermuda Race veterans will tell you, one of the highlights of the small island nation is its signature cocktail, the Dark 'n' Stormy. Is there another mixed drink that can claim as strong an association to sailing as this potent blend of rum and ginger beer? After all, rum has been the favored tipple of mariners for centuries; as for ginger, its anti-seasickness properties are legendary.



You can't use just any rum in a Dark 'n' Stormy, though. Ber-

muda's own rum distillery, Gosling's, produces a dark-aspitch rum called Black Seal. It's aged in charred oak barrels, and this gives it a distinctive sweet and smoky character that blends only too well with the spicy bite of the ginger beer (never, ever, use ginger ale).

You can try lighter rums, but it's not the same. The smoke -and-molasses kick is what makes it special. Indeed, Gosling's is so convinced of this that it has trademarked the Dark 'n' Stormy name.

According to Gosling's, there's only one way to make a Dark 'n' Stormy. Fill a tall glass with ice. pour in half a can or more of ginger beer, then gently add about an ounce and a half of Black Seal. This will sit at the top of the glass in a rather ominous fashion, evoking an approaching storm cloud-and if you have more than a couple, you'll almost certainly be under the weather.
