Looking Ahead Vice Commodore Wesley Moy

arch is upon us, spring is in the air, and the Pentagon Sailing Club will be doing everything it can to help you get back to the Potomac River, Chesapeake Bay, and on the water again. The river and bay training schedules have been finalized and posted to the website and slots for both are filling nicely.

Planning for the Memorial Day Raft-Up is well underway and it sounds like there are just one or two slots left. In July, we have over 40 sailors heading to the British Virgin Islands and we may have others heading to the Puget Sound in the Pacific Northwest. Personally, I can't wait that long. Brenda and I along with River Co-Commodore Roger Hammer and PSC member Sharon Baker are spending a week in March sailing the Caribbean Windward islands of St. Lucia and Martinique.



The next three Membership Meeting programs are specifically designed to help you get out on the water. In March we'll take a look at the river and bay schedules and we'll have materials available so that you can sign up right there. Make sure you bring your calendar along. We are also going to talk about the gear you need to go sailing. What's must have, what's nice to have, and what's a waste of money. In April, new(er) member Jordan Gottfried will be sharing his research on what skippers and sailors think makes a good crew member ... the kind that always seem to be welcome on a boat. Jordan has been surveying PSC skippers and crew since last fall and will be reporting on his research. At May's meeting Communications Commodore Don Hupman will be giving us the ins and outs of chartering boats. If you've ever wondered what to put in a sailing resume this is the time to find out.

If it seems like the MDRU and training sails are filling up fast, remember there are other ways to get out on the water. All of our qualified B-CSN and D-CS skippers can charter boats through Annapolis Bay Charters and other companies on the Bay (and beyond). They may be organizing a charter or might be interested in being a skipper for a trip that you organize. If you are a B-KBS skipper our fleet on the Potomac River is waiting for you. In addition, Annapolis MWR will charter a boat, up to about 30 feet, to you to sail on the Chesapeake.

Commodore Tony Skivo and I have been discussing destinations for the Commodore Sails. Once a month, we are going to try to coordinate a place to meet up somewhere on the Bay, about a day's sail from Annapolis. The idea is to give you enough time to plan to meet up for diner, for sightseeing, or whatever the location seems to offer. As we get the plans together we'll announce them at Membership Meetings, on the website, and here in the Lubber's Line. These sails will be great opportunities for our skippers to organize a boat and for our boat owners to raise a crew and meet up to enjoy one of the finest sailing destinations in the world. Some of the places we discussed include Rock Hall, Annapolis, Kent Island, Knapps Narrows, Solomons Island, Oxford, and Galesville. We are not always going far and Annapolis and Galesville are our home ports.

PSC Racing Squadron Offers New Training Opportunities

re you looking for a local venue on the Potomac to continue developing your sailing skills beyond your basic keelboat rating? Looking for a new challenge in sailing with a more competitive edge? Are you looking for all of this in a relaxed social environment at a bargain price? Then the PSC Racing Squadron (RS) is for you!

In addition to continuing another great season of racing with the Dangerfield Island Sailing Club (DISC), this year the RS will offer weekend racing seminars and a match racing series. The season will kick off with the Basic Racing course on March 17th, a classroom session covering the fundamentals and theory of racing. Six additional seminars and match racing events will be held through September. Each of these events will include two hours of additional academic instruction at the clubhouse followed by practical on-the-water practice of skills and match racing against our own PSC boats. Members will be organized into regular teams, who will compete for awards to be presented at our end of season Hydrilla Cup picnic.

This year, the RS will continue participation in DISC with Chris Elenbaum

three boats in Tuesday evening races. We will continue to offer spinnaker and non-spinnaker entries for all levels of racing experience. New for this year, the RS will establish a dedicated Tuesday evening team in the non-spinnaker class, seeking to improve our place in the DISC standings.

For the bargain price of \$200, RS members can take advantage of up to16 hours of academic training, 30 hours of on-the-water instruction, six PSC races, and more than 24 DISC races. To be a part of the RS, you must be a PSC member and possess a US Navy B-KBS certification or an equivalent US Sailing or ASA rating. he switch to Daylight Savings Times marks the pre-dawn of our 2009 sailing season. With red skies at night, this season will be a delight. The club is looking for both seasoned keelboat instructors and our newest B-KBS qualified sailors to serve as assistant instructors on the river. Our first two basic keelboat classes are already full plus we will have a "new" boat in our fleet to break in. We need a lead instructor and four primary instructors for each class. Assistant instructors basic responsibilities include assisting the primary instructors in the conduct of sail training, maintaining sail gear, assisting new students with life jackets, rigging and de-rigging boats, and finally sharpening your own sailing skills.

Our basic keelboat course is the club's primary income generator. Its' success completely depends on the volunteering of all club members – seasoned and new. Please consider teaching at least one day on the river during the 2009 sailing season. B-CS or D-CS qualified members can serve as lead instructors with the approval of the Training Commodore. As an incentive, each lead, primary and assistant instructor will be able to log additional sailing hours against their next level of qualification, and receive a FVSM coupon for every 8 volunteer hours. All of the Saturday and Sunday

on-the-water classes start at 8:00 AM and end at 5:00 PM.

Instructor training sessions will be held April 18th (Saturday) and 19th (Sunday) at the Capitol Cove Marina, Bolling AFB. All prospective river instructors must attend one of these two sessions, which will cover safety, club policies, training program conduct and objectives, lessons plans, administrative information, and other pertinent topics.

here has been an absolutely fantastic response by PSC members to this year's British Virgin Islands charter trip.

We started out planning on only four boats this year, but we are now up to seven boats and 47 people with a good possibility of adding an eighth boat. We will, however, need another skipper if we do add an eighth boat.

Remember that anyone may go on this trip: all PSC Members, their families, and guests are welcome.

The dates are July 10th through July 20th, 2009. That is 11 full days on the

water for the price of only 7 days, We can, of course, accommodate any travelers who can't take off more than a week.

Our itinerary will include visits to some of the most beautiful islands in the Caribbean: Tortola, Virgin Gorda, Jost Van Dyke, Norman Island, Peter Island, Cooper Island, and Anegada (also known as the "Drowned Island").

Most of our days in the BVI will consist of relatively short sails with ample time for relaxing lunch stops and plenty of time for snorkeling in warm, crystal clear water and sightseeing. Our boats will often spend the night at the same anchorage, which allows crews to socialize and eat meals together. There will also be scuba diving opportunities for any interested divers.

On Saturday, April 4th, we will have a trip dinner meeting at a place and time to be determined. We'll get together to meet other BVI bound sailors, to discuss the BVI, to talk about possible itineraries, to answer any questions, and to have some good food and fun.

2009 Puget Sound Charter Trip Duane Covino


uget Sound is waiting for the PSC! The planned trip to the Puget Sound by PSC members and friends is still on, but we want to find a week that works for those who can make this trip.

urrent State Boating Course Requirements (information extracted from *Chesapeake Bay Magazine*).

Delaware: Required for boaters born on or after January 1, 1978.

Maryland: Required for boaters born on or after July 1, 1972.

Pennsylvania: Required for boaters 12-15 years old and all personal watercraft users.

Virginia: Required for personal watercraft users ages 14 and 15.

District of Columbia: Required for all boaters.
