he Pentagon Sailing Racing Squadron (RS) had its birth in 2006, after the initial efforts of John Cavedo and Charlie Peck to train a group of Pentagon Sailing members in sailboat racing, the nuances of sail trim, and the ISAF Racing Rules of Sailing. The program continued to a more formal status in 2007, when PSC put together a formal racing squadron with its own charter, qualification process, and organizational rules. PSC also joined the Dangerfield Island Sailing Club (DISC), which sponsors races on the River on Tuesday nights and weekends.

As we continue to grow and build our expertise as racers, we are also continuing to improve the competitive position of our boats. Our current spinnaker capable boats, Falcon and Eagle, are our two principle racers. We recently outfitted Falcon with completely new lines and halyards, and made other improvements. We have also purchased new sails for her, which should arrive soon.



These include a new 150 Mylar genoa that we will only use for racing.

We will shortly have a newer donated Capri 22 that will hopefully be our new fast boat. Most of the boats in the series are larger (25-30 feet), but we are aided by a handicap rating that can improve our score. On the docks, this boat will take the place of KESTREL, which we will place on the hard, until we can figure out what to do with her.

The Racing Squadron has grown to over 25 members, and for two years, has represented the most rapidly growing focus of interest in the club. The Racing Squadron members have also provided the lion's share of maintenance support over the past year for the river fleet, which all Pentagon Sailing members benefit from.

As we have grown in number, a number of our members have extensive racing experience, including the Naval Academy racing teams. Some

Charlie was the most enthusiastic sailor I have known. He arrived at the dock for every Tuesday evening race overflowing with such contagious delight at getting back on the water that we boat mates couldn't help being filled with the spirit too.

He was at his best when the wind kicked up and the spray flew. But I remember even more, those weak-winded upper Potomac evenings when we drifted along at less than a knot and some of us could easily have drifted off into a nap. Charlie never stopped racing. He had us tweak and re-tweak every conceivable sail control. We balanced and rebalanced the boat. We craned our necks for the first sighting of a little patch of breeze on the water. He never gave up.

Ashore, Charlie could be bodacious and outrageous. He could not hold an opinion inside. They came bursting out, Katy bar the door. His computer fired missives that looked like they could spontaneously combust. Charlie was a colorful personality!

I have a collection of pictures of Charlie in my mind that will be with me for a long, long time:

One is in that Alexandria bar where we sometimes have Club meetings. It is of Charlie and me, right in each other's faces, shouting insults and accusations at each other that we really didn't mean over some matter that I've completely forgotten I would have called him the next morning to apologize, but he got up earlier and got to me first.

Another picture is Charlie at any Tuesday post-race beer and burger fest at the Slip Inn. Charlie reveled in those affairs, trading sea stories and gossip with us like-minded folk.

Another picture is at sunset, in the Bolling AFB Marina. It's Charlie, standing ramrod straight on Falcon's foredeck, with his hand on his heart while the Base speaker system played the Star Spangled Banner.

I'm going to miss him.

he Winter Training Program finished up in April for the 2007-2008 season with two Red Cross CPR/First Aid classes. Thanks to Red Cross Instructor Rich Fellner for providing this important training for our members.

Contact Jim also if you are interested in serving as an instructor on the river. Remember that Bay Skipper Candidates now must teach on the river to qualify as D-CS skippers.

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Memorial Day Raft-up Update Hal Moore

f you are thinking about the raft up, this year we will be going to St. Michaels. St. Michaels is a beautiful town, with a wonderful bay museum, lots of historic buildings, great restaurants, and lots of neat shopping. It is a great place for all ages. It corners the market for "boutiquey-chiquey-weekey" on the Eastern Shore.

We will be berthing at the Harbour Inn (http://www.harbourinn.com/index.html) in St. Michaels. They have free bicycles for our use, a pool, Jacuzzi, and an on-premises spa. It has wireless internet, free cable hookup, and complimentary newspapers and coffee, shuttle service



through town, and free water taxi to take you over to the museum side of the harbor. However, you will probably want to walk in St. Michaels.

The Chesapeake Bay Museum (www.cbmm.org) brings to life the story of the Chesapeake and its people with nine exhibit buildings and the world's largest collection of traditional Bay boats. Explore our 1879 Hooper Strait Lighthouse, working boatyard, and hands-on displays. The boatyard specializes in maintaining traditional Bay boats using traditional methods. It is very much like Williamsburg in that there are exhibits with craftsmen, with whom you can interact. Discover exhibitions detailing the Bay's roll throughout history, oystering, steamboats, water fowling, and more. There are usually skipjack captains and boat builders giving presentations. It also has an historic bay lighthouse that you can explore.

The St. Mary's Square Museum has historical exhibits on St. Michaels the way it was from the 1800's. Open from May to October, Sat/Sun, 10 AM - 4 PM. Other times by

reservation. Private tours are available; please call 410-745-3984. St. Mary's square has a number of beautiful buildings in the area.

Wives can go to "3 Krazy Ladies" to shop for SHABBY-CHIC-UNIQUE From fancy to funky, country to krazy, you are sure to find something you like, while husbands can gravitate to the boatyard at the museum.

The St. Michaels website (<u>www.stmichaelsmd.org</u>) has a complete list of activities.

There is still room on the Memorial Day Raft Up boats. This is a great deal for those who enjoy sailing and interesting places to visit. For those interested in getting signatures for their Bay qualifications, you can get three days of sailing (enough to complete Senior Crew) for the price of four days on the bay.

For those of you who have never been on a bay sail with PSC, I have posted a video of a PSC sail last fall. (http://www.youtube.com/watch?v=lgVUbHO2CdA). We are sailing hard and fast to make our dinner reservation in Solomons Island.

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Treasurer's Report Larry Paulson

hanks to the work of 2007 Treasurer, Joe Rymal, the Pentagon Sailing Club generated income that exceeded expenses in excess of the \$5,000 Joe used to establish a Capital Improvement Fund. The annual cash flow through the club was approximately \$65,000 for 2007.

The 2008 Bridge developed and recently approved a balanced budget for 2008 with cash flow projected around \$54,000. Major expenses are approximately \$22,000 for Bay Operations, \$12,000 for River Operations, and \$4,000 for the annual Holiday Party.

Our most significant capital improvement investment this

year will be new sails for Falcon; a Dacron Main and 110 Jib, and a 155 Mylar racing Genoa. We will continue to add to our Capital Improvement Fund so that we can continue to upgrade our river fleet which now numbers five boats as well as other club-wide improvements.

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of our members are participating in racing seminars, such as the J World Annapolis racing clinics.

Tuesday nights are practice nights through most of April, while the racing on Tuesday nights kicks off the last week of this month. We will race in almost all of the weekend races this year with DISC, which are usually on Saturdays. We are setting up Sunday afternoons from 1500 to Sunset as a regular "practice time".

How does it normally work? Just to get a planning idea, we ask that all RS members notionally sign up at the beginning of each year for races that they are planning each year. This step helps the RS to ensure that we have enough racing skippers of record (SOR) for the races based on the number attending. The week prior to the race, the SOR for that boat will send out a coordination message to the entire RS announcing who the crew is, and other information such as the race course, weather, tides, and currents. The SOR may get additional people who want to sail or cancellations. We may need to get an addi-



tional SOR for an additional boat if we have a lot of people wanting to race. We also may have a "training boat" go out if we don't have a Racing SOR, but have members who want to sail.

On the day of the race, we arrive an hour and a half early and start getting

the boat ready. In addition to the normal boat preps that river skippers may be used to, we have to get our gear bags out of the RS locker in the club house as well as the spinnakers and racing sails, which are in the sail loft. We normally like to get out to the racing areas, which are south of our marina, across from Old Town Alexandria, or at Haines Point, which is to the North, across from the airport.

Once on station, we start to practice our line up for the start. The races normally take an hour to two hours, and we often, on Tuesday nights, do not return until sunset or later. After we return, we put away the boats and gear, wash down the boats, and then adjourn to the clubhouse to drink beer, eat, and tell tall tales.

The next day the racing SOR puts out a recap of what transpired. We repeat this cycle each week. We limited our racing last year to Tuesday nights, but this year we will be adding weekends.

The fee to join the Racing Squadron is \$200. Some may ask "why so much?" First, racing on the river is hazardous, and there is an added insurance cost to the club. We do not eat this cost as part of general club revenues, because not everyone is interested in racing. Second, the most intensive use of the boats by club members comes from the RS, which adds wear and tear. Third, there is a fee to participate in DISC. Fourth, the funds build up a fund for making improvements in the fleet to benefit the RS. For example, this year we have purchased special high performance sails and gear for Falcon, which are only for use by the RS.

Do you have any hope of becoming an SOR? Absolutely. Racing is obviously a bit different from what we normally teach and expect in the B-KBS course. There is a lot of spinnaker work, and it takes some additional training to learn the additional complications (and

hazards) of using it. The racing rules and sailboat racing tactics are different as well. As a result, we want you to feel comfortable with all of the crew positions, as well as these aspects of racing, before becoming a racing skipper of record. We are always looking to do what it takes to get people qualified.

If you have never raced, it is the most fun that you will ever have sailing. It isn't a "read a book in the cockpit" activity like cruising can be, but it definitely generates sea stories. But more importantly, it is probably the best thing you can do to build your skills as a sailor. When you have raced for a while, you definitely take with you a feeling of confidence whenever you head out cruising on the bay or the ocean.

The RS had a kickoff meeting on 1 April, where we helped to get the boats ready for the season, as well as having



an organizing meeting, and elect new RS governance. The RS elected as its representatives on the Racing Committee Charlie Peck, Stephanie Vavonese, and Hal Moore. Darrell Harris continues as the sponsoring Bridge member in his capacity as River Commodore.

BoatU.S. Members' Top 10 Favorite Boating Movies


