Here's what you need to know!

Monthly Meetings are Great Gatherings

Plan now to join us for our monthly club meetings. We hold them on the third Monday of the month and our location is easy to find and gives us our own meeting space. **Bailey's** in Crystal City has varied and reasonably priced food—check out our web site for details.



We are insured...and have new deductibles

Our club renewed the Starkweather and Shepley policy through the Travelers for our River boats and programs in May 2011. We updated our River Release Forms and Float Plans to include more language forbidding the use of and carrying of alcohol on the boats. Deductibles have also changed as shown below

Deductibles:

- B-KBS Class with ASA/Navy Sailing Lead Instructor present (\$250) the club will always pick up the deductible for a training class.
- Social Sail (\$1,000) the club will not pick up this deductible
- Racing (\$1,000) the club will not pick up this cost.
- Training Class with lead instructor not present (\$2,500) we will never let that happen.

Our River policy does not include night sailing. This provisions means that if you go our for a social sail or race, and come back after the sun has set, you are covered. However, you cannot depart at 7:00 PM with the intention of staying out all night. You must be at the marina or anchored at night.

We eliminated the Bay provisions of our PSC policy to preclude any conflict with the insurance policy offered by Annapolis Bay Charters (ABC) on the boats we charter from them. With ABC, we may sail almost anywhere on the Bay; the one place that we cannot go is Kent Narrows. We can sail at night. We can carry alcohol on the boats; as long as we stay beneath the Maryland BAC limits, we are fine. Once you moor or anchor, then you can have a party.

Deductibles are based on the size of the boat. For boats 39 feet or less, the deductible is \$1,000. For boats 40 feet or over, the deductible is \$1,500. ABC will check the credit card of each skipper for that amount when chartering.

Fellow PSC sailors,

Marina Safety

Most novice sailors believe that the number one cause injury, damage, and death is from encountering the "Perfect Storm" in the ocean. WRONG!! The number one cause of "negative sailing outcomes" are accidents in the marina. The most common cause of damage is boats banging into each other or piers. As part of our mitigation against this cause, we heavily emphasize close quarter maneuvering.

Watch Your Step

The other cause of death and injury comes from falling in the marina area or falling into the marina itself. Marina slips are loaded with cleats, pilings, lines, irregular surfaces, and power cables that can represent trip hazards. Walk slowly and keep focused on these hazards. When stepping from the pier to a boat, try to board from the amidships area near the shrouds, where the boat is most stable. Let everyone know that you are stepping on or off.

A club member on a Bay sail recently slipped and fell while boarding a Bay boat. The boat was stable and level with the finger pier. The day was sunny, and all of the surfaces were dry. He was not carrying anything. Yet he lost his footing while trying to board, hitting his face on the boat. He has had to have extensive facial surgery.

Since 2007, we have had two incidents where people have gone into the water at the Bolling marina. One person was trying to rig a sail on a dinghy, shifted his weight too much, and went overboard. The other person stumbled over a cleat and went in.

Expensive

When carrying wallets or electronic devices down to the marina or on the boats, put them in sealed plastic bags. When passing personnel belongings from the boat to the pier, pass them slowly, one item at a time. In the past five years, club members have lost thousands of dollars from cell phones, PDAs, and car key remotes going into the water.

Marina Deaths

There are two principal causes of death for sailors. One is the failure to use preventers when sailing downwind. The other is sailors working on their boats alone. They fall into the water, and drown. Whenever you are working in a marina, always have someone with you. When the water is cold, you only have a few minutes before you will pass out, so wear a life vest. At Patuxent River, a very experienced sailor was down working on his boat alone in West Basin and did not return home that evening. They found his body several days later in Patuxent River.

Jackson Wong, of Potomac Sails, who has built the sails for several PSC Club boats and several club members, died two years ago when he went to work on his boat in Annapolis and never came back. These types of deaths often occur in the winter months when the marinas do not have many people available to render assistance with the water being cold. Potomac Sailmakers Jackson Wong

I dropped some canvas at Potomac Sailmakers today and got some terribly sad news. Jackson "Jack" Wong, the owner, died on Saturday, December 15. He went to winterize his boat and didn't come home. The authorities guess that he fell overboard at some point and couldn't get back on board. They recovered his body the next day.

Jack has been a member of SCOW over the years and a great supporter of the club. In particular, when one of our sails has needed repairs, he did the work for us immediately so that we could get our boats back into service. He did great canvas and sail work for the club and many members (including both me and my wife). The club, the sailing community and many of our members have lost a friend. ANNAPOLIS, MD - Jackson Wong, age 72, died Sunday, December 16, 2007 in Annapolis, MD while preparing his beloved sailboat the "Fy Shun", (meaning "Fast Ship"), for the winter season.

He was born in Yakima, Washington on February 7, 1935 to Wong You and Dong Shee and raised on the family farm in Union Gap. In 1954, Jackson graduated magna cum laude from Yakima High School. He went on to attend Yakima Junior College, Washington State University, then transferred to Oregon State University in Corvallis, OR where he was awarded his Bachelor's degree in mechanical and automotive engineering in 1958. He was awarded the Standard Oil Fellowship for graduate work and received his Master's degree in 1959. Early in his career he worked with Boeing, Bell Aero Systems, Gellcomm, and Atlantic Research on projects in advanced propulsion and control systems. As a contractor to NASA for lunar and planetary missions, he conducted advanced research in aerospace technology in metallurgy, propulsion, and control systems.


Mr. Wong was an avid sailboat racer who collected numerous trophies. He was a member of the Herrington Harbor Sailing Association and the Tartan 30 Association. He was also a partner in an Annapolis marina for many years. Mr. Wong's passion for sailboat racing led to a successful custom sail and canvas fabricating enterprise, Potomac Sailmakers, Inc. based in Alexandria, VA. Since starting the company in 1972, his aeronautical engineering skills served him well in designing highly efficient sails which gained him worldwide recognition. His company was responsible for engineering custom canvas work which included unique projects such as: electronic golf devices with time and distance sensors embedded in the fabric, the honor guard sentry shelter at the Tomb of the Unknown Soldier, and curtains for the White House press room.

He is survived by his wife Joetta Miller of Annandale, Virginia, and his brother Joe Wong of Yakima. Visitation will be 10 A.M. to 11 A.M. Friday, December 28, 2007 at the Keith and Keith Funeral Home 9th Avenue Chapel, 902 W. Yakima Avenue, Yakima, WA. Funeral services will be at 11 A.M. in the 9th Avenue Chapel, followed by interment in Tahoma Cemetery. The family suggests memorial contributions be made to Oregon State University to establish an Engineering Scholarship in memory of Jackson Wong, OSU Foundation, 850 Southwest 35th Street, Corvallis, OR 97333.

The Pentagon Sailing Club Racing Squadron is a group of club members who have fun by promoting the sport of sailing both inside and outside the club. We are always developing the racing squadron as a venue for club members to improve their sailing skills in an environment of friendly competition. As a group we like to promote camaraderie with our fellow sailors on the Potomac by regular participation in racing events with the Daingerfield Island Sailing Club, the Sailing Club of Washington and others. Helping maintain the River fleet has become a tradition for the team and we want to continue the racing squadron's exemplary record of participation supporting PSC boat maintenance and the river training program.



We race the club's three Capri 22s against other skippers from the DISC. The racing fleet of over 50 vessels is a mixed design, performance handicap fleet racing in both spinnaker and non-spinnaker classes. We also race the occasional weekend regatta with DISC. Weekly Tuesday evening races began in mid-April and continue through October. The team had a great time last year and took home first place class trophies for the Tuesday evening racing series and for the 2010 Leukemia Cup Sailing Regatta. This year we are looking to expand club participation in the annual Leukemia Cup where we test our skills against crews from as far away as Ouantico.

The Racing Squadron is also planning a River Raft-up, which will use our river boats on an overnight rafting trip.

Racing is a great way to add an exciting new dimension to your sailing experience and the Squadron continues to welcome new members every year. The annual fee of \$200 buys your racing all season (about 24 races) including participation in the Leukemia Cup. There are also opportunities to sail in other DISC-sponsored races on an ad hoc basis, usually on the weekends. 
